President's Message

The plans for the 2005 Annual Meeting are set! This year's theme is "PASS IT ON" which is a reference to the Academy's motto and to our obligation to our students and our discipline. The conference is our 75th anniversary meeting. Jim Morrow has done an excellent job of putting together an exciting conference that will blend our past, present and future. Emeritus Fellows, Active Fellows, International Fellows, and New Fellows will be in attendance, clearly an opportunity to "Pass it on." The 75th anniversary meeting will be September 29 – October 1, at the Dallas Marriott Solana. The conference program and other information regarding the location are included in this newsletter.

I would like to thank the chairs and members of our various committees that have performed significant tasks for the Academy during the past year. Much of the work of the Academy is done through the Standing Committees and the ad hoc committees. The complete list of our committees and their members is posted on our website. Reports from the committees will be part of the annual business meeting in Dallas. Chairs of these committees will soon receive requests for their committee reports and the template used to prepare those reports. One important aspect of these reports is the recommendations from the committees on how their work can be improved through changes in the operating procedures of the committee or the Academy. The Executive Committee will review all reports and make those changes necessary.

I want to highlight a few points in this column. First, I'm pleased to announce that Steve Silverman was elected President-Elect and John Shea was elected Member-at-Large. We conducted this year's election and also the selection of New Fellows electronically. From all indications, both processes had high response rates. We will continue to develop this method and will be interested in any feedback from the Academy members regarding this approach. Thanks to Jane Clark and her committee for preparing an outstanding slate of candidates for the election and also to Penny McCullagh and her committee on membership for reviewing and recommending nominees as new members.

Second, the Doctoral Program Review Committee, chaired by Jerry Thomas, is conducting our second national evaluation of doctoral programs in Kinesiology. More than 30 schools are

participating in the survey. To ensure that our survey results are meaningful, we have contracted with Jim Morrow and Allen Jackson to conduct the data analysis. Both Jim and Allen are assessment experts and are not from a university that participates in the doctoral program evaluation (their department doesn't offer a doctoral degree in kinesiology). A special session to report the results of this evaluation will be held during our annual meeting.

Third, the ad hoc Committee on Program Accreditation, chaired by Wojtek Chodzko-Zajko, discussed with representatives from the American College of Sports Medicine its initiative to accredit undergraduate and graduate programs. The committee's report is included in this newsletter.

Additional information will be discussed during the annual meeting.

I hope that each Fellow of the Academy will be able to attend our 75th Anniversary Meeting in Dallas. Mark your calendars, arrange your travel, and be part of a unique historical meeting for the American Academy of Kinesiology and Physical Education.

Letter from the Past-President

Executive Committee Conference Call Minutes

November 10, 2004

Present: B. Ainsworth, J. Clark, J. Morrow, G. Payne, G. Reeve, K. Scott, M. Sherman
Called to order (9:35am CST) by President G. Reeve

1. Minutes from the Executive Committee meeting of September 9, 2004 were approved with the following changes:

In #5 - "have offered their services" should be changed to "will be asked"

In #5 - "fee of \$500 will be charged" should be changed to "fee of approximately \$500 will be charged"

In #6 - "with a negative response" should be changed to "with a concern"

In #8 - "due to the negative response" should be changed to "due to the concern"

2. Minutes from the Executive Committee meeting of September 11, 2004 were approved with the following changes:

In #5, 4th bullet - "Morrow would like to obtain photos of all current fellows for the website" should be changed to "Morrow would like to obtain photos for the 75th Anniversary Meeting."

In #9 - "conference site will be the Marriott Solana in Dallas, TX." Should be changed to "conference site will be the Marriott Solana in Westlake, TX."

In #3.1 - "from the current \$33 to \$42" should be changed to "from the current \$33 to \$44"

3. Recommendations were made to the minutes of the Business Meeting on September 11, 2004. These minutes will be approved at the next Business Meeting.

In #7 - "\$42" should be changed to "\$44"

In #8 - "letters would be sent to relevant department chairs to be shared with their Graduate Deans to promote need for the review" should be changed to "the AAKPE President would be contacting Department Chairs and encouraging them to communicate with their respective Graduate Deans to respond to the NRC request for input by indicating the need for kinesiology to be added to the Taxonomy."

In #8 - "a fee of \$500" should be changed to "a fee of approximately \$500"

In #8 - "the expenses to this organization" should be changed to "the expenses to AAKPE."

In #8 - "Spring, 2005" should be changed to "Summer 2005"

4. AAKPE's nomination for the President's Council of Physical Fitness and Sports Honor Award was discussed, and a nomination was approved by the Executive Committee.
5. Guidelines for posting Doctoral Program information on the AAKPE Website were discussed with the newly revised wording being approved. Updates were requested with the deadline for submission set at July 1st of each year.
6. The newsletter is in process, though M. Sherman still needs a column from J. Clark and G. Reeve. M. Sherman indicated that he will be able to send the formatted newsletter to K. Scott by November 19, 2004. The newsletter will be made available in final form in January of 2005.
7. J. Morrow updated the group on planning for the 2005 Conference in Westlake, TX (Dallas). The theme will be "Pass it on." So far, eleven speakers are committed with three still in process. Dr. Ken Cooper will make the keynote presentation. J. Morrow indicated he would like to present each fellow with a medallion in honor of the 75th anniversary. The Committee will wait for the final estimate on medallion cost prior to approving the expenditure.

K. Scott announced that a contract had been signed with the Dallas Marriott Solana in Westlake, TX (Dallas) for next year's conference. The dates will be September 29 through October 1. This will be announced in the newsletter as well as posted on the website.

AAKPE is scheduled to return to the Westward Look in Tucson, AZ for the 2006 Conference. That room rate will be \$139 per night. All rooms have been renovated since our last meeting at this site.

8. J. Morrow reported that letters were sent to Department Chairs asking them to speak to their Graduate Deans to solicit support for kinesiology as a part of the ongoing effort to convince NRC to include kinesiology in the NRC program evaluation process. At least eleven universities recommended to the NRC that kinesiology be considered.

J. Morrow and A. Jackson have signed the work agreement contracting them to do data analysis and write-up for the current doctoral program evaluation. The next step is to notify Department Chairs that the evaluation process will begin again within the next week or so.

J. Morrow prepared a 16 page document for the potential speakers for the NRC meeting that is planned for December. Morrow felt that the data presented in the paper were impressive and should be convincing. Even if the effort is successful in convincing the NRC to include kinesiology in the evaluation, the first round of evaluations would not be until late this decade. AAKPE is prepared to conduct the evaluation in the meantime.

The fee for program evaluation was discussed with a motion made (M. Sherman, second by G. Payne) to set the fee at \$600 per institution. Motion passed with 1 abstention.

9. A new Presidential Committee has been formed to consider accreditation of exercise science/ exercise physiology programs in response to the recent ACSM/CAAHEP effort to accredit. Representatives of AAKPE have spoken to J. Whitehead, Executive Director of ACSM. ACSM/CAAHEP appear to be moving forward with their intent. AAKPE is developing a set of questions and issues to present to ACSM/CAAHEP at an upcoming conference call. Following that call, an appropriate next step will be taken.
10. Several fellows were considered for nomination to AAKPE offices. Executive Committee members were asked to consider other possibilities, and send ideas to J. Clark.
11. Donations to AAKPE were discussed. The question was raised as to what is done with the money contributed, and should it be placed in a special account, so it can be more carefully monitored. K. Scott said that donations total approximately \$250 to \$300 per year. The group agreed that, at that rate, a separate accounting is unnecessary. G. Reeve charged the two members-at-large, B. Ainsworth and M. Sherman, to create some ideas, and make a proposal, for use of monies donated for discussion during the Spring conference call.
12. Use of the AAKPE website and mailing list was discussed with the group agreeing that the mailing list should not be released for external use. The group also agreed that AAKPE should consider using the website as a free service for posting position announcements. Interested parties could be asked to submit a PDF file that would be posted. The website Committee (M. Sherman and D. Porretta) will consider the idea further, and report back to the Executive Committee.
13. Ideas were considered for better publicizing the AAKPE and the new fellows. Strategies

- should be considered to enhance awareness and clarify the perception of AAKPE's purpose.
14. K. Scott announced that the upcoming Quest is in process with all papers, but one, having been received.
 15. K. Scott informed the group that the AAKPE registration form will be placed on the website for online registration with capabilities for credit card payment. Hard copies will still be sent to fellows.

Executive Committee Conference Call Minutes (Draft)

March 30, 2005

Called to order (1:30pm ct) by President G. Reeve

1) Minutes of the Fall Conference Call (November 10, 2004) were approved unanimously.

Motion – J. Morrow

Second – M. Sherman

These minutes will be updated on the website to indicate their approval.

2) Update on Graduate Program Evaluation – J. Thomas addressed the status of the project. A general discussion of the project ensued. Most institutions have submitted their data for evaluation; four are missing. The recommendation was made to send those four programs a reminder to forward their data. Overall, the response to date was believed to be “very good.” The next major step involves the analysis of the data by J. Morrow and A. Jackson. A preliminary analysis is expected by early June. The analysis will be sent to the Executive Committee to determine if the analysis is complete. Once approved, a paper will be composed for publication in *Quest*. The group agreed that the Doctoral Program Evaluation Committee, chaired by J. Thomas, will prepare the manuscript and the Executive Committee will determine authorship and how it will appear in *Quest*. Regardless of authorship the paper will be an “official” paper of the AAKPE. J. Morrow will also report all findings at the Dallas meeting at a session scheduled for 11:30am on Saturday. Finally, the complete data will be posted on the website, and a letter will be sent to all participants from President G. Reeve thanking them for their participation. A motion was made to formally request the Evaluation Committee write the paper in question including the analysis of results. The motion was unanimously approved.

Motion – G. Payne

Second – M. Sherman

J. Thomas signed off.

3) Fall 2005 Conference Program – J. Morrow noted that a preliminary conference program is posted on the website. The theme for this year’s conference in Dallas is “Pass it on.” Speakers are confirmed with titles coming by April 1, 2004. Kim Scott will be ordering medallions as commemoratives of the conference/anniversary. The recommendation was made to have K. Scott explore getting medallions that come with an inexpensive plastic stand, so that the medallions can be displayed as well as worn.

The question was raised as to whether fellows not in attendance at the conference should receive the medallion. Consensus agreement was reached that all registrants will receive a medallion; those fellows not present can buy a medallion at cost plus shipping and handling fees.

The Executive Committee did not approve of J. Morrow's idea to have a black tie/formal banquet. However, a motion was unanimously passed to send special invitations to all AAKPE Past Presidents for a Past Presidents Breakfast on Saturday morning. The breakfast should include approximately twenty people with spouses not being included.

Second – M. Sherman

A motion was also unanimously passed to have prestigious leaders from related organizations come to the Dallas meeting with their registration fees being the same as that for Fellows.

Motion – B. Ainsworth

Second – G. Payne

J. Morrow recommended having an area at the Dallas conference for the inspection of archives relating to the history of the organization. The Committee generally agreed to the idea of the assigned area. A specific motion was passed (1 no vote) to spend no more than \$236 to buy copies of four dissertations related to the history of AAKPE. These dissertations would be made available in the archives area at the Dallas Conference. These dissertations will remain the property of AAKPE.

Motion – J. Clark

Second – B. Ainsworth

a) J. Morrow requested that all executive Committee members send him the names of Presidents/Executive Directors of related organizations.

b) J. Morrow also requested that AAKPE Fellows send him photos (head shots preferred) for display at the conference in Dallas.

4) Conference Site – K. Scott indicated that registration costs are still being determined, but speculated that it would be approximately \$175 with the cost of the medallions. The room rate stands at \$84 per night with free shuttle service from the airport. The Committee agreed to keep the costs of registration in the range of \$175-\$190. K. Scott said she would like to have the registration packets sent out by July 1, 2005 or earlier. The information should be posted on the website by May 1.

5) ACSM Program Accreditation Report – J. Clark, a member of the committee to consider ACSM's move to accredit programs, reiterated that the AAKPE will refuse the invitation to be a sponsoring organization in the ACSM effort to accredit programs. G. Reeve will prepare and send a letter to the ACSM indicating the decision not to accept the invitation. He will also send a letter to all AAKPE Fellows and leaders of related associations indicating the AAKPE position on the ACSM effort.

6) J. Morrow announced that AAKPE has been invited to become a Presidential Partner in the Presidents Council on Physical Fitness and Sports "Get America Moving Program." Morrow further stated that this partnership carried no additional responsibilities, and the AAKPE would not have to do "anything." AAKPE will, however, be listed on the PCPFS website at no cost. A motion was passed unanimously to accept this invitation.

Motion – G. Payne

Second – B. Ainsworth

7) Online Voting Update – K. Scott informed the Executive Committee that April 16, 2005 will be the last day to vote. A final reminder will be sent out to all Fellows. Scott further indicated that a similar process will be employed for the selection of new Fellows if the new voting system is

positively received. K. Scott was commended on completing the new system, and the Committee was reminded that a change in the operating code would be required to reflect changes in the new voting process.

8) Website Enhancements – Executive Committee members were asked for ideas on upgrades for the AAKPE website. The main sentiment was that it simply needed to have a “facelift.” “Make it look fresh!” The recommendation was also made to put related links in the same box. K. Scott will have a designer create some ideas for change while M. Sherman will work on the overall organization of the current material on the website.

9) J. Morrow explained that Don Lawrence, Azusa Pacific University, and Ruel Barker, Brigham Young University, are two of the authors the historical dissertations discussed in #3 above. They would like to have the “support” of the AAKPE, be able to come to the meeting in Dallas, and have access to interviewing senior Fellows. The Committee encouraged the two individuals to pursue this research, but the AAKPE would not offer “support.”

10) No reports from Executive Committee members

11) New Business

a) K. Scott was asked to study labor and costs issues related to having multiple year memberships for the AAKPE. This topic will be an agenda item for the Fall meeting.

b) New Fellows – future agenda items will include the question of the AAKPE buying publicity (e.g., in publications of related associations) to congratulate new fellows or send a press release to the new fellows’ associations with their biosketches.

On December 13, 2005 representatives of the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs Committee on Accreditation for the Exercise Sciences (CoAES); the American Academy of Kinesiology and Physical Education (AAKPE) Presidential Committee on Accredited Programs; and the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) met to discuss issues related to the recent decision by CAAHEP, ACSM and others to pursue the accreditation of Exercise Science and Exercise Physiology academic programs.

In this report we summarize the major points of discussion that were raised at the meeting:

1. Title of the accredited programs:

In response to concerns raised by the AAKPE committee members, the ACSM and COAES (Committee on Accreditation of Exercise Sciences) representatives agreed that the titles for the accredited programs (Exercise Science - at the undergraduate level; and Exercise Physiology at the masters degree level) were over-broad. **They agreed to change the title and scope of the accredited programs to "Applied and Clinical Exercise Physiology"**. They additionally agreed to provide clearer explanations of the expected roles and job descriptions that graduates at each level would play in the health and fitness field. If this were achieved it would significantly narrow the scope of the accredited programs from the currently published standards. It would remove references to other disciplines within Kinesiology (e.g. biomechanics, motor control, sport psychology etc). If this happens it would be a significant concession by ACSM and would help to overcome some objections from other disciplines within exercise science.

2. Absence of Licensure or Certification:

Members of the AAKPE committee raised the issue that the ACSM CAAHEP accreditation is premature because it attempts to accredit an area which does not currently require licensing of individuals working in the field. AAKPE committee members pointed out that it is both unprecedented and impractical to accredit programs that are not associated with a clearly defined "profession". Without a widely adopted licensure or certification process, it is very difficult to identify those Kinesiology students who will work in the "health and fitness industry" from those that will not. **No consensus was reached on this point.**

3. Concerns about other CAAHEP accredited programs:

Concerns were raised by AAKPE committee members that CAAHEP as an organization focuses primarily on accrediting two year Associates degree programs in allied health related fields and that CAAHEP may not be the best organization to oversee undergraduate/graduate programs in applied and/or clinical exercise physiology. ACSM representatives responded that CAAHEP does accredit four year and graduate programs in addition to their extensive accreditation of two-year programs and that they remained an advocate for a CAAHEP relationship? **No consensus was reached on this point.**

4. ACSM Future Plans:

ACSM strongly suggested that they intend to continue in their plans to accredit programs leading to professions in Applied and Clinical Exercise Physiology. **They invited AAKPE to join the process as a co-sponsor of the ACSM CAAHEP accreditation.** The AAKPE committee members responded that we are not empowered to make any decisions on behalf of the Academy and that we can only forward information to the AAKPE President and Executive. However, our committee believes that there is no precedent for AAKPE as an organization to participate in the accreditation of academic programs. There is no support among our AAKPE Committee that the Academy participate in the co-sponsorship of the CAAHEP/ACSM Initiative. **We recommend that the AAKPE President write to the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs Committee on Accreditation for the Exercise Sciences on behalf of the Academy declining their invitation to co-sponsor the CAAHEP/ACSM Initiative**

Our committee will continue to communicate with representatives of ACSM and the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs Committee on Accreditation for the Exercise Sciences (CoAES) in order to determine the extent to which they follow through on their commitment to change the scope and title of the accredited programs to "Applied and Clinical Exercise Physiology". ACSM has agreed to provide us with a written update of their progress in this area.

We would be pleased to provide the Academy with a report of our discussions at the next AAKPE Executive Committee meeting as well as at the next meeting of the Academy.

From Herbert Haag

Prof. em. Dr. Dr. h.c. Herbert Haag, M.S. (University of Kiel, Kiel, Germany) has published quite extensively in the last time. Three books (all written in English) try to make a contribution from a German perspective related to Sport Science.

(a) The dictionary (with translation of the 2000 terms in various languages) is intended to increase the international communication in sport, sport education, and sport science.
